Tool Developed With ONS Input Wins 2010 National Health Information Award

The Spanish language version of the National Coalition for Cancer Survivorship's (NCCS) Cancer Survival Toolbox®, a free, self-learning audio program that helps people develop important skills to better meet and understand the challenges of their illness, was selected as a winner in the 17th annual National Health Information Awards, which recognizes the best American consumer-health information programs and materials. Ruth Van Gerpen, RN, APRN-CNS, AOCNS®, a clinical nurse specialist at BryanLGH Medical Center in Lincoln, NE, and a past ONS director-at-large, served as ONS's board-appointed liaison in the toolbox's development.

The Spanish language version of the Cancer Survival Toolbox received a Bronze Award in the Patient Education

Information class for Other/Miscellaneous Material. The toolbox was selected from more than 1,000 entries judged by a national panel of health information experts.

The Cancer Survival Toolbox is available in audio in English and Spanish and in writing in Chinese. The tool addresses specific issues for people recently diagnosed with cancer or people who are facing difficult decisions or life changes caused by cancer. Topics covered in the toolbox include how to effectively communicate with one's doctor or healthcare team, how to make decisions about cancer treatment, how to find ways to pay for care, and caring for caregivers. A grant from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention has enabled NCCS to provide disease-specific programs for hematologic cancers, including multiple myeloma, non-Hodgkin lymphoma, chronic lymphocytic leukemia, and chronic myeloid leukemia.

National Cancer Institute Awards ONS Member as First Woman, First Nurse Principal Investigator



Deborah Watkins Bruner, RN, PhD, FAAN, the independence professor in nursing education in the School of Nursing at the University of Pennsylvania and co-program leader in the Abramson Cancer Center, both in Philadelphia, has been awarded a U10 grant from the National Cancer Institute (NCI) as principal investigator of the Radiation Therapy Oncology Group (RTOG) Community Clinical Oncology Program (CCOP). Bruner is the first woman and first nurse to be awarded principal investigator of an NCI-sponsored cancer clinical trials cooperative group. The RTOG CCOP is the only CCOP research base focused solely on providing radiation and combination therapy-related symptom amelioration trials and state-of-the-art

radiation treatment trials to the CCOP community, accruing almost 2,000 patients since 2005.

Bruner has worked with the RTOG since the early 1990s and has been principal investigator or co-principal investigator for 10 clinical trials. Bruner serves on the NCI Clinical Trials Advisory Committee, which helps set the NCI clinical trials research agenda. In addition, Bruner is cochair of the NCI Symptom Management and Health Related Quality of Life Steering Committee, which reviews and prioritizes NCI-funded symptom management and quality-of-life research. As principal investigator of the RTOG CCOP, Bruner will be using a novel framework to combine patient-reported outcomes with translational science to improve symptom management after cancer therapy.
