Nail Receives Association of Community Cancer Centers' Clinical Research Award



Oncology Nursing Society (ONS) member Lillian M. Nail, PhD, RN, FAAN, has received the Association of Community Cancer Centers' (ACCC) Annual Clinical Research Award for her significant contributions to

cancer research. Nail is the Dr. May E. Rawlinson endowed professor of nursing and senior scientist at the Oregon Health and Science University School of Nursing in Portland. The award was presented at ACCC's 20th National Oncology Economics Conference in San Diego, CA, on October 10.

Nail is internationally known for her research on coping with cancer treatments and their side effects. She has worked to ensure that cancer treatment-related fatigue receives priority in the cancer symptom-management research agenda. Currently, Nail's research efforts include investigating ways to promote coping with radiation therapy for breast cancer, management of cancer treatment-related fatigue, and patients' experiences with low blood cell counts because of chemotherapy. Nail has received numerous awards, including the 2002 Distinguished Researcher Award from ONS and the 2002 Rochester Distinguished Scholar Award. She holds a Research Career Development Award from the National Cancer Institute for clinical research development on supportive care in cancer.

A widely sought-after speaker, Nail helps to educate healthcare providers and consumers about coping with cancer care. She has contributed nine book chapters and more than 40 journal articles to the medical literature. Nail received her PhD in nursing, her master of science degree in medical/surgical nursing, and her bachelor of science degree in nursing from the University of Rochester in New York

Kaplan Honored for Outstanding Volunteer Work With GHI Mets Magic Award

Kaplan has helped thousands of women during her 23-year career as a nurse.
